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DeWitt County reports new cases of COVID-19

County health officials are reporting three new cases of coronavirus. Case number 29 is a 76 year-old female household member of a previously reported case. Both patients are residents of Cuero, but are recovering in a skilled nursing facility in Victoria.

Case number 30 is a 70 year-old male household member of a previously reported case. This person is a patient in a hospital in Victoria. The other household member is no longer hospitalized and recovering at home.

Case number 31 is a 60-year old female Cuero resident who is isolating at home during the illness. She reports recent travel to San Antonio, but the source of her community spread cannot be confirmed at this present time.

A previously diagnosed case of a nursing home patient has been changed to reflect a false-positive diagnosis and that case has been further categorized to reflect the patient has recovered.

A total of 31 cases have been diagnosed in DeWitt County since Governor Greg Abbott declared a state of emergency on March 13, 2020. Fourteen, including these diagnosed cases, are isolating at home or in a secure medical facility. Sixteen have recovered. One death in the county is attributed to COVID-19 infection of an individual with a comorbidity.

In an effort to slow the spread of this infectious disease, Texas Governor Greg Abbott has issued Executive Orders during this period of emergency. In EO GA-14 he directs citizens to "stay home" and "stay safe." More recent Executive Orders are directed at reopening the Texas economy in a safe and deliberate manner.

Individuals may be exposed to COVID-19 and be infectious even when no symptoms are present. If you believe you have been exposed, monitor yourself closely for symptoms such as fever, cough, sore throat, and shortness of breath for 14 days after the exposure. If you experience any of these symptoms and do not need urgent medical attention, isolate at home and contact your healthcare provider.

If an individual knows they have been exposed, they should not go to work. If a fever and cough are present, they should isolate themselves from others at home and monitor symptoms.

Minimizing exposure is especially important for people who are 65 or older or who have an underlying health condition like heart disease, lung disease, diabetes, high blood pressure or cancer. People in those groups have a higher risk of developing severe complications if they do get COVID-19, and the safest thing for them during an outbreak will be to stay home as much as possible and minimize close contact with other people. To get ready, they should talk to their doctor about getting additional prescription medications and have enough household items and groceries on hand to stay home as needed.

The judge and emergency management personnel are communicating daily with state officials and regional leaders about the spread of the COVID-19 virus and referring callers to the official websites of the Centers for Disease Control and the Texas Department of State Health Services. These websites are great resources for the general public according to Judge Fowler.
