## DeWitt County reports new case of COVID-19

County health officials are reporting one new case of coronavirus. Case number 43 is a 35 year-old female resident of Cuero who is recovering at home. She recently had close contact with a family member living in Victoria who has also tested positive.

A total of 43 cases have been diagnosed in DeWitt County since Governor Greg Abbott declared a state of emergency on March 13, 2020.

Seventeen, including these diagnosed cases, are isolating at home. Four are inpatients of medical facilities in Victoria. Twenty-one have recovered. One death in the county is attributed to COVID-19 infection of an individual with a comorbidity.

Throughout DSHS Region 8 which covers 28 counties east and west of San Antonio and includes an estimated population of 3.1 million people, a total of 8,928 cases have been confirmed since tracking began. More than 4,200 of the individuals diagnosed with the coronavirus have recovered. DSHS Region 8 is tracking 314 additional cases that are pending investigation. Those numbers are not included in this publication. The agency reports 130 deaths due to COVID-19 in the region.

Clearly, seventy-seven (77) percent of the confirmed cases are located in Bexar County where the county judge has issued an executive order requiring retail businesses to require employees and customers to wear face masks when social distancing is not possible.

In an effort to slow the spread of this infectious disease, Texas Governor Greg Abbott has issued Executive Orders during this period of emergency. In EO GA-14 he directs citizens to "stay home" and "stay safe." More recent Executive Orders are directed at reopening the Texas economy in a safe and deliberate manner.

Individuals may be exposed to COVID-19 and be infectious even when no symptoms are present. If you believe you have been exposed, monitor yourself closely for symptoms such as fever, cough, sore throat, and shortness of breath for 14 days after the exposure. If you experience

any of these symptoms and do not need urgent medical attention, isolate at home and contact your healthcare provider.

If an individual knows they have been exposed, they should not go to work. If a fever and cough are present, they should isolate themselves from others at home and monitor symptoms.

Minimizing exposure is especially important for people who are 65 or older or who have an underlying health condition like heart disease, lung disease, diabetes, high blood pressure or cancer. People in those groups have a higher risk of developing severe complications if they do get COVID-19, and the safest thing for them during an outbreak will be to stay home as much as possible and minimize close contact with other people. To get ready, they should talk to their doctor about getting additional prescription medications and have enough household items and groceries on hand to stay home as needed.

Judge Fowler and emergency management personnel are communicating daily with regional leaders and public health officials about the spread of the COVID-19 virus and referring callers to the official websites of the Centers for Disease Control and the Texas Department of State Health Services. These websites are great resources for the general public according to Judge Fowler.
